ROSA LASAOSA: ODE TO EARTH

With an apparently simple carpet of wheat covering the floor of the Newport Art Museum's Wright Gallery, site/installation artist Rosa Lasoasa connects both with the heartland of America and with ancient rhythms of work and meditation. Ode to Earth captures the human need to dig into the earth, to find rhythmic relaxation in work, and to hear and feel nature. What was once an integral, taken-forgranted experience has become a means of discovering peace amid the mad rush of an information-laden society bereft of clarity.

The artist's installation includes a series of twelve judiciously placed balls representing silos that protect the earth's bounty for its future use, and a mantra of threshed wheat pouring into those silos. She openly invites visitors to walk barefoot on the wheat carpet and (to borrow a phrase from Carly Simon) to feel the earth move under their feet. Above all, the experience of this sedentary, almost passive wheat garden insists on solitude, reflection, and a matching of one's own rhythm with the earth's. As a metaphor, Ode to Earth fulfills its meditative purpose if you let it; as a practical experience, it slows you down long enough to remain with you as a reminder that, in fact, you should slow down more often.
